Step 2: Masking & Protecting

Use low adhesive masking tape to tape off areas where you don't want the plaster to be applied, such as edges, outlets, and light switches. Tape off surrounding walls with two lines of tape to ensure no plaster goes out of your lines. Remove any furniture or items from the area you'll be working on and cover the floor and nearby objects with drop cloths or plastic sheets to protect them. **(Attention) When taping off areas such as stained wood or wallpaper be sure to use extra low adhesive tape and avoid keeping tape on surfaces for extended amounts of time.**

Step 3: Apply a Primer

A primer helps the Venetian plaster adhere to the wall better and creates a consistent surface. Apply a high-quality primer with a paint roller or brush and allow it to dry completely. This step promotes better adhesion and prevents the plaster from absorbing too much moisture.

Step 4: Mix the Venetian Plaster

Read the instructions provided with the Venetian plaster product and mix it according to the manufacturer's specifications. Generally, you'll need to combine the plaster with a small amount of water in the bucket provided until you achieve a smooth, pudding-like consistency. Use a drill with a paddle attachment for efficient mixing.

Step 5: Apply the First Coat

Using a stainless steel trowel or spatula, apply the first coat of Venetian plaster to the wall. Begin by loading a small amount of plaster onto the trowel and spread it evenly on the wall at a 45-degree angle. Work in small sections to maintain control. Apply consistent pressure to create a thin and even layer. The first coat will not require any burnishing on the surface. **(Attention) Inspect your surface after each coat to ensure no dried buildup of unsmoothed plaster is sitting on wall. Scrape these chunks of extra material after each coat to ensure a level surface.**

Step 6: Apply Second Coat & Lightly Burnish

For a more textured look, apply additional 2 coats of Venetian plaster. After the first coat each additional coat will require light burnishing with your trowel. Allow each coat to dry before applying the next. With each coat, adjust the technique according to your desired effect. Experiment with different trowel movements, such as swirling, stippling, or dragging, to create unique patterns and depth.

Step 7: Apply Third Coat & Burnish the Surface

After the second coat dries, typically before it dries completely use Venetian plaster trowel to burnish the surface. This step involves polishing the plaster, enhancing its smoothness and sheen. Apply pressure while moving the tool in circular or figure-eight motions. Continue burnishing until the desired finish is achieved. **(Attention) Burnishing has best results when started after wall is 50% dry visibly in color and can be touched without disturbing the surface. Make sure to NEVER sand your wall after the final coat which will result in surface scratches.**

Step 8: Apply a Wax Topcoat

Once you're satisfied with the texture and appearance of the plaster, apply a protective topcoat. This helps seal the surface and enhances durability. Choose a compatible sealer recommended by the plaster manufacturer, and follow the instructions for proper application and drying times.
